BROADWAY MELODIES



 LOHENGRIN - Bridal Chorus / Richard Wagner Franz Liszt directed the first performance at the Court Theatre, Weimar, August 28, 1850.

2. **NABUCCO** - Chorus of the Hebrew Slaves / Guiseppe Verdi

After their defeat by Nebuchadnezzar [Italian diminutive: Nabucco] and his army, many Israelites were taken back to Babylon as slaves. During their work on the banks of the Euphrates, the slaves sing this chorus "Va pensiero" (Dearest homeland, my thoughts fly to thee, ... great Jehovah, Hear the voice of thy people at last). In 1842, when Nabucco was first performed at La Scala, Austrian armies occupied much of Italy and this chorus became a national song among the Italian people. When La Scala reopened after World War II, Nabucco was its first production.

- 2. ALCINA Chorus of enchanted islanders / George Frideric Handel Opened April 16, 1735 in London's Covent Garden. Alcina (a beautiful sorceress in love with the Knight, Ruggiero) is gradually deprived of her powers by Ruggiero and his wife Bradamante.
- LUCIA DI LAMMERMOOR Chorus of Wedding Guests / Gaetano Donizetti
 First performed in Naples, Sept. 26, 1835, this opera is based on Sir Walter Scott's novel <u>Bride of Lammermoor</u>.
- 4. MADAMA BUTTERFLY The Humming Chorus / Giacomo Puccini Opened Feb. 17, 1904 in La Scala, Milan.
- 5. **CARMEN** Habanera & March of the Toreadors / Georges Bizet Soprano Soloist: Patricia Charette

Bizet's masterpiece and last work - he died June 3, 1875, 3 months to the day after it was first performed at the Opéra-Comique in Paris. Its passionate force shocked French audiences (most press notices were hostile, some critics labeled it immoral - French society in 1875 was very Victorian, in reaction to the moral laxity of the Second Empire). "Carmen is a liar and a thief, unscrupulous but fearless, independent and fascinating not simply by her physical charms but by the honesty and violence of her feelings." It's music startled French audiences in places - in rehearsal the orchestra had declared many passages unplayable, and the women of the chorus at first refused to learn the chorus of the cigarette girls and some other numbers. The initial run closed after 45 performances. The 36-year-old composer died on the night of the 31st of these. In October 1875 it opened in Vienna and in June 1878 in London. These foreign performances were the beginning of Carmen's great popularity, especially London where "Habanera" was already very popular and "The March of the Toreadors" soon rose to the top of the charts.

6. **PORGY AND BESS** - Medley / music by George Gershwin, lyrics by DuBose Heyward and Ira Gershwin. Soloists: Mary Hill and Peter Cowan.

It is "summertime" in a poor, black section of Charleston, SC. Bess, the abandoned girl of the brutish Crown, who has killed a man and run away ("My Man's Gone Now"), takes refuge with the crippled beggar Porgy ("I Got Plenty o' Nuttin'"). She grows to love the kindly man. At an all-day picnic, the wily dope peddler Sportin' Life, pokes fun at the God-fearing people ("It Ain't Necessarily So"). After she is enticed to run to New York with Sportin' Life, Porgy sets out in his goat cart to search for her ("I'm on My Way"). Porgy and Bess opened in New York, Oct. 10, 1935, closing after 124 performances, but over the years has become a favourite all over the world.

7. **SOUND OF MUSIC** - Medley

Music by Richard Rodgers, lyrics by Oscar Hammerstein II
Rodgers & Hammerstein's last collaboration opened on Broadway, Nov. 16, 1959. Critics weren't
enthusiastic, but the public made it a smash hit and it stayed for 1442 performances.

- 8. MAN OF LA MANCHA Medley / Music by Mitch Leigh, lyrics by Joe Darion After opening on Broadway, Nov. 22, 1965, it continued for 2328 performances.
- 9. BRIGADOON Medley

Music by Frederick Loewe, lyrics by Alan Jay Lerner

When it opened on Broadway, March 13, 1947, Brigadoon joined Oklahoma!, Carousel, Annie Get Your Gun, Call Me Mister, Finian's Rainbow, Street Scene, Beggar's Holiday, and revivals of Victor Herbert's Sweethearts and Oscar Straus' The Chocolate Soldier - a normal season on booming post-war Broadway. It opened in London, April 14, 1949.

10. GODSPELL - Medley / Words and music by Stephen Schwartz

Soloist: Mary Hill

Opened May 17, 1971 on Broadway and Nov. 17, 1971 in London.

11. **JESUS CHRIST SUPERSTAR** - Medley

Music by Andrew Lloyd Webber, lyrics by Tim Rice

An overblown production opened on Broadway Oct. 20, 1971 and ran for 711 performances. A simpler version lasted 3,358 performances in London, opening there Aug. 9, 1972.
