



"Blest are they they that mourn," begins Johannes Brahms' "Ein Deutsches Requiem", Op. 45 (A German Requiem). This requiem, unlike the traditional Mass of the Dead of the Catholic Church, has its texts soothing those who are left behind to mourn and grieve. The choir sings of consolation, of life's transience, of a mother's comfort, and of the acceptance of death with peace and serenity.

Brahms's choice of various texts of the Lutheran bible, is in part, for his loss at the deaths of his mother and of his good friend, mentor, and composer, Robert Schumann. Texts are from the Sermon on the Mount, the Psalms, Old and New Testament writings, and the Book of Revelation. An anxious baritone questions his length of days and a mother comforts her child, setting the framework for the day of judgement in which the choir asks: "Death, where is thy sting? Hell, where is thy victory?" A sublime ending echoes the opening movement with "Blessed are the dead, that they rest from all their labour."
